## About the wood...

Westgate Farm Wood, located in Thornton in Lonsdale, was planted in 2005.

The wood contains just over 1200 native broadleaf trees including Ash, Rowan, Sessile Oak, Bird Cherry, Hazel, Hawthorn and Holly.

The woodland amounts to almost 2.5 acres in size and links with small areas of existing woodland adjacent to the site, and other areas of woodland previously planted by YDMT, including Edith's Wood (SD679740) and Cowgill Wood (SD685745).

## How to get there...

From Thornton in Lonsdale follow the road signed Dent passing Glebe Farm and Thornton Hall. As the road levels out slightly, turn left (at the top of the hill next to the Thornton viewing point) and passing a communications mast follow the road until you reach Westgate Farm Wood. The farm buildings are on the right and the wood is on the opposite side of the road.

A public footpath runs along the northern boundary of the wood, passing Cowgill Farm and leading to the minor road from Thornton-In-Lonsdale to Dent. This is marked from the road by a wooden signpost.
