

Beamsley Wood



About the Wood

Beamsley wood has been planted with just over 6,000 trees in an area of Lower Wharfedale that is teeming with wildlife. The River Wharfe is close by so dippers, wagtails, and herons may be seen.

Established woodland around the newly planted Beamsley wood contains many species such as squirrels, hares, foxes and badgers and as the new wood grows it is expected these will begin to hunt and live there too.

During the spring and summer, the established wood has an abundance of ground flora including bluebells and primrose and will provide good habitat for insects and pollinators including butterflies, bees, wasps and moths which over time will also move into the new woodland

- Do not light BBQs, fires, or camp, bring your horses, bike or motorised vehicles to the site.

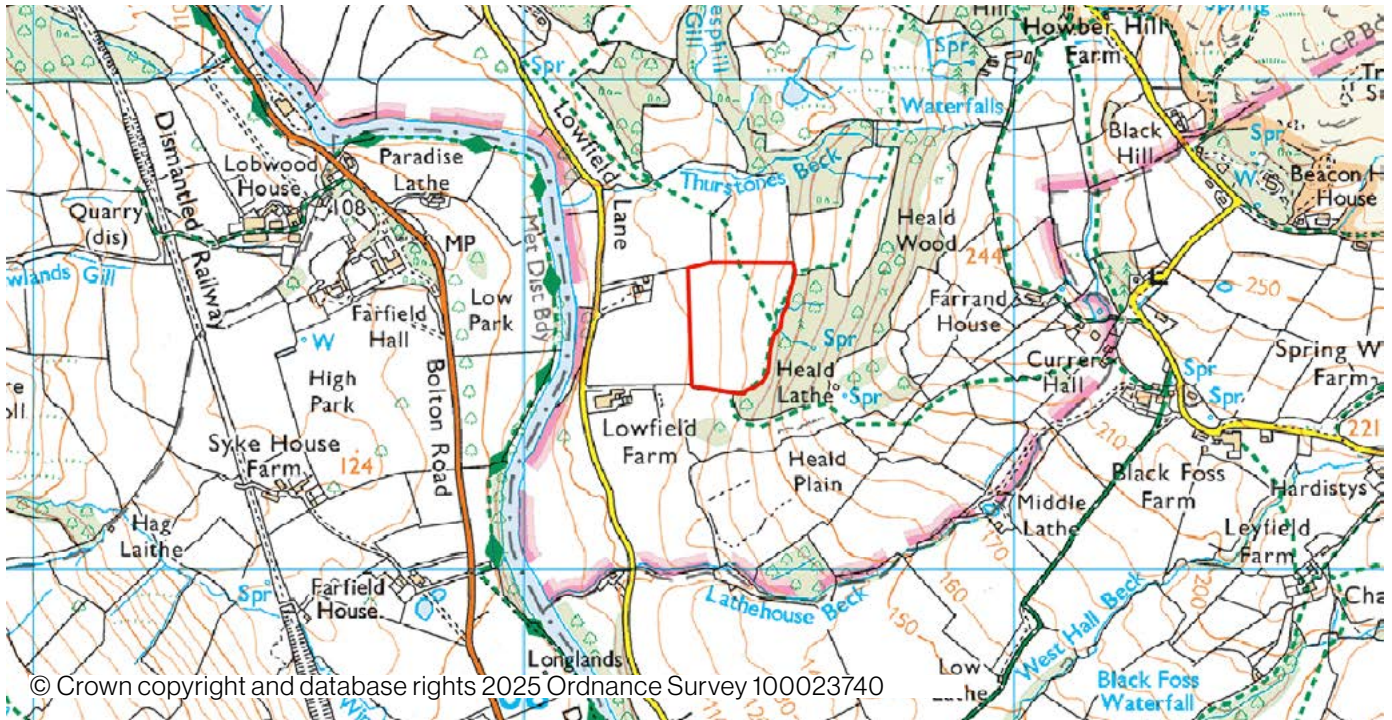
What to look out for



- Warblers, Flycatchers, Woodpeckers, Red Kites, Buzzards and Sparrowhawks
- squirrels, hares, foxes and badgers
- Wildflowers such as bluebells and primrose
- Peaceful views across the River Wharfe
