

# Longridge Wood



## About the Wood

Set in the heart of the Yorkshire Dales National Park between Cray and West Burton, Longridge Wood is Yorkshire's very own Hundred Acre Wood covering an area of approximately 100 acres (41 hectares).

During the winter of 2013/14 39,600 native broadleaf trees were planted here on a site that boasts some of the best views over Bishopdale.

In 2014 Longridge Wood was on show to the world as Le Tour de France cyclists passed right by the site during Stage 1 of the Grand Départ!

All the saplings have been planted with individual tree guards to protect them from harsh weather conditions and damage caused by rabbits. The site is also fenced to prevent damage from livestock.

### What to look out for



Species planted here include:

Alder, Downy Birch, Rowan, Hazel, Field Maple, Wild Cherry, Whitebeam, Hawthorn, Blackthorn, Holly, Dogwood, Lodgepole Pine, Scots Pine.

## Visiting the wood

Longridge Wood is near to the B6160, approximately 8 miles from Aysgarth and 4 miles from Buckden.

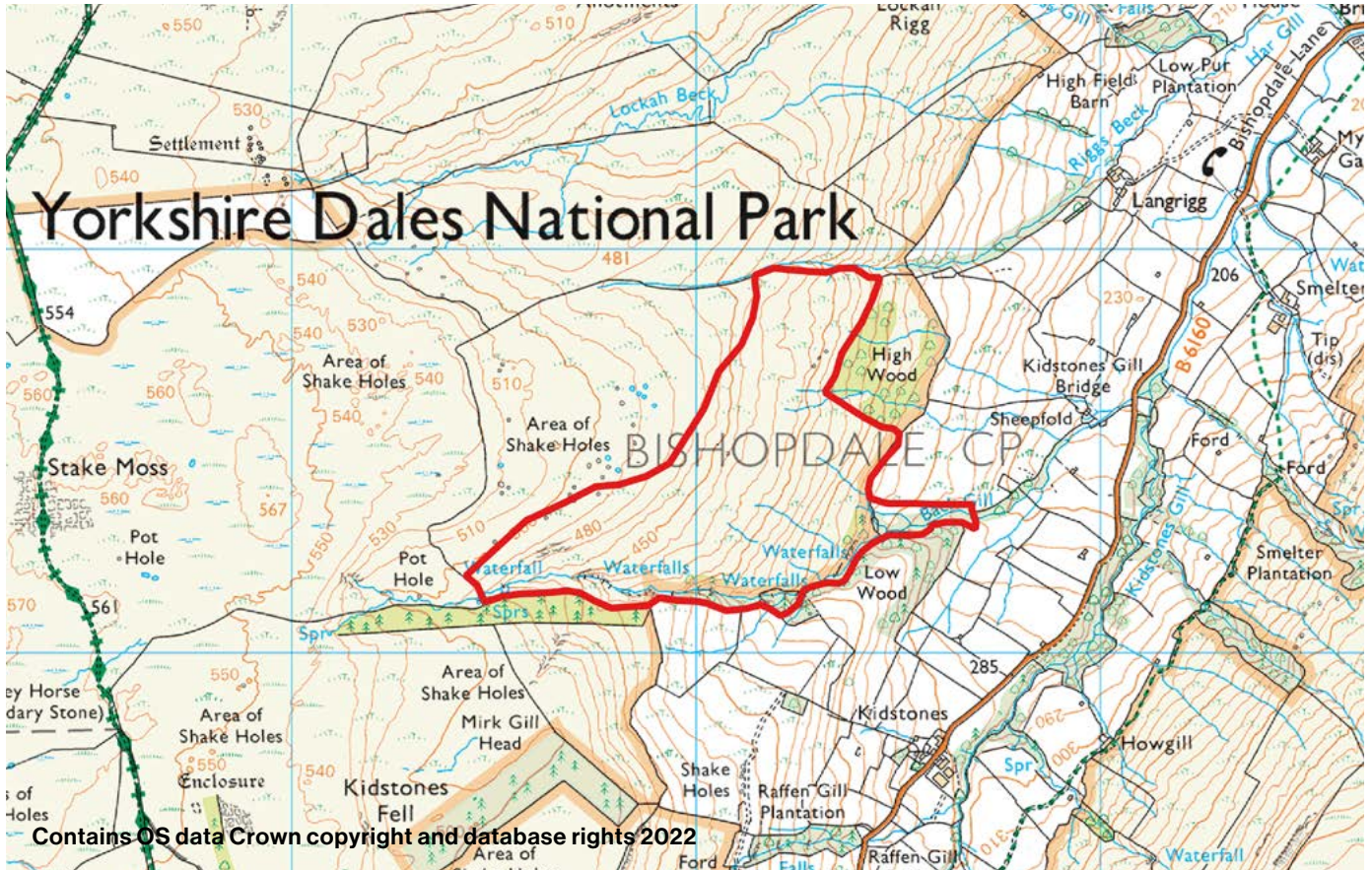
When approaching from the south on the B6160, the woodland is visible on your left, set high up on the hillside.

This is private land which is not open to the public (except on official YDMT woodland open days). There are no public rights of way within the immediate vicinity of the woodland but the footpath on the opposite side of the dale offers a good view of the woodland.
